The Quail Ridge Development Committee met on November 14, 2001, in response to receipt of a Notice of Preparation of Environmental Impact Report for this project. Basically, the Committee objected to a number of aspects of the proposed development, including walls and guard houses at the road entering and exiting the project; regional trails in the project; severe disruption of the land forms by grading up to 60 feet off of the tops and ridges of mountains; inadequate drainage and septic studies; and, most importantly, the massive disruption of wildlife corridors and the biological impact on plant and animal species. Two sites will be tested on our creek and an additional two on Agua Hedionda Creek.

While complete, scientific results of the spring sampling are not yet ready for publication, we do have preliminary results. As expected, the Escondido Creek is in an impaired condition. A low number

Much of the gardening media on the market does not address our special climate. But a special group of publications does address southern California gardening. They make perfect holiday gifts for the gardeners on your list.

Sunset has numerous items, many available at local home improvement and bookstores. I have had a subscription to the monthly magazine for over 20 years and much to the chagrin of my husband, I never toss one out! The gardening section includes a monthly to do list, construction projects and new trends, tools and plants. Sections on travel, home improvement and cooking also make this my favorite mag. The Sunset Western Garden Book is the bible of many a southern California gardener. It was completely revised and updated this year. Sunset also has the Western Landscaping Book and Problem Solver to round out the trio. Sunset can also be reached at www.sunset.com and at 800-526-5111.

My personal favorite is written by Del Mar treasure Southern California Gardening, a Pat Welsh. month-by-month guide is simply the best book for southern California gardening on the market today. The month-by-month format, down to earth explanations and simple solutions are invaluable. The book has an easy to read format, excellent index and in-depth discussions not found anywhere else. Gardening is addressed from an organic point of view, but not to the exclusion of chemicals if necessary. Better living through chemistry is no longer an appreciate motto. But, chemicals are useful if used sparingly after organic methods fail. I have had the pleasure of attending several Pat Walsh lectures; if you ever get the chance to hear Pat Walsh, do not pass it by. Pat Welsh's Southern California Gardening, a month-by-month guide is available at Barn's and Nobal and Armetrona's

Now if you have any time left to garden this month you can plant bare-root roses, berries and vines, plant camellias and bulbs that have been chilled. Keep planting cool season flowers and veggies (see list from previous Chaparral). Prune natives, raspberries, and grapes and fruit trees. Water if no rain, turn off the sprinklerís if it does. Start compost and mulch trees and to stop weeds.

With regard to speeding, I believe that community-requested radar traps (or other types of speeding enforcement) have often backfired on the very residents whose representatives had requested them. Admittedly anecdotal, but over the years I've noted that where law-enforcement statistics on such activities were reported, they indicated that the majority of issued tickets ended up with local residents. 80% was a figure that sticks with me, although I don't know if this is typical. Certainly I don't know how many residents are in the HGR hinterland.

Those of us that live here are going to be aware of horses, driveways and the bicycle traffic. Horses are an area where many city folk are sadly oblivious due to simple unintended ignorance. A radar trap won't help with that. Maybe non-standard signage would.

The increased heavy-traffic volume (re cement trucks) during the day would probably reduce traffic speeds since EFR & HGR are double-yellow end-to-end; the risk of incidents may be more affected by density & restricted through-vehicle visibility rather than speed. Perhaps concerns are mainly with this heavy commercial and other vehicles associated with the dam project. Can a "Rent-a-Cop" legally target only certain types of road user, and if so is this the intention?

There is little evidence that speed ticketing improves driver awareness, safety or indeed consideration of other road users, except temporarily for the individual so convicted. They do provide a good revenue source for city or state, and boost insurer profits. However no doubt that the fact & reports of the continuing & conspicuous presence of a prowling cruiser may of themselves be effective in keeping things subdued; but would Officer Rent-a-Cop be using a regular black-and-white or his girlfriend's Honda Accord? Prevention better than cure...

Hearsay is that CHP & police officers don't tend to ticket at less than 7 or 8 mph over posted limits, except in school zones or during urban purges. Very few people don't speed every trip even on this basis, and I'd say a majority roll stop signs. I'm not sure our local population is so different, even or especially in this the main artery into/out of & through their own neighborhood.

It may prove fruitful to look into the relative effec-

those listed above, or just the result of economic or manpower concerns. Many CHP officers are very savvy about traffic patterns & driver behavior. If they offered any perspectives it would be useful to include such in any decisions or plans made. Whether specific areas are prone to certain types of accidents is a simple example of info they might provide. The idea of providing "protection" needs careful consideration if it is to be effective rather than symbolic.

Finally, we shouldn't forget that we have most of the control over local safety via our own driving habits. The most dangerous places for road users are near to their homes so there is one area we can improve ourselves. Apart from head-on collisions (especially common in good conditions in daylight) & reckless or substance-impaired drivers, the major risks to all are from vehicles entering, exiting (or turning around on) rural roads to sideroads or driveways, anything where a vehicle impedes, interrupts or crosses the flow of traffic. Again that means us, our guests and our service folks. What we can all do is be proactive in safely entering & leaving our driveways or sideroads: -Giving ample and proper turn signals (adding hand signals if we think it makes sure we're seen), both in time & distance (which will probably exceed the 100ft recommended in the CA driver's guide, certainly BEFORE we position the vehicle and start to brake); -Doing our best to make good use of our mirrors to see what's going on behind and around us before turning; -Not pulling out of driveways or sideroads in front of other vehicles forcing them to slow (in spite of law changes that make this OK sometimes); -Observing oncoming vehicles long enough as they approach to judge their speed and not just their distance; -Positioning our vehicles well especially for left turns both to be seen & to allow vehicles to pass on the right when possible; -Slowing down & giving wide berth around horses, joggers or cyclists. This also shows others the "country way".

If we want the area to be safer, let's start with us, over whom we do have control, and improve our interactions with other transiting & dam-related road users, over whom we don't. Indirectly, I suspect that attention to our road behavior, maybe with a dash of
