Welcome to the New Year in our rural community. One of the things that make this area so special is that we have an organization, the Town Council (TC), to channel and focus the strength of our community members. Any adult resident owning property within the borders of Community Service Area (CSA) 107 is eligible to vote in our upcoming February elections and to serve on the Board of Directors. We will accept nominations at our January meeting.

We are also considering a proposed boundary extension to include the thirty or so homes that are in Harmony Grove but outside of CSA 107. Many residents living in this area wish to be included in the TC and feel that it would be stronger if it could represent all of Harmony Grove. Because there is no clear consensus on how Eden Valley should be represented, no action is proposed to include Eden Valley.

We will be handling the election a little differently this year to allow for immediate representation of the remainder of Harmony Grove, should it be included. This year's ballot will allow special nominations for a representative from the new area of Harmony Grove who would serve on the board only if the proposed boundary change were to be approved in the same February election.

EFCF Board Elections in February By Betsy Keithley, Secretary EFCF

The Elfin Forest Community Foundation was established in 1995 with the mission to enhance the quality of rural life in the community of Elfin Forest. The net assets at the end of the fiscal year (June 30, 2003) were \$348,791. The Foundation provides funds for project supplies or community events.

Our last deadline for submission of applications was October 15, 2003 and 4 proposals were funded for a total of \$6,800. The projects and recipients were Jane Bernasconi for trees along Elfin Forest Road by Fortuna del Norte, Arie Franken for carpet in the community room at the fire station, The Escondido Creek Conservancy for computer equipment for making presentations to groups about the work and needs of the Conservancy and the Trails Committee for maintenance and replacement of existing fencing. Thanks to all these people for their community service.

It is time again for annual elections for Board membership. The election will occur in February, 2004 at the time of the Town Council and Fire Board elections. The term is 3 years with a minimum of 2 face-to-face meetings per year to review grant applications that are due in April and October. If you would like to run for election, please submit to the EFCF, a letter so stating and include signatures from 2 community residents. Also please include a short paragraph - about your community experience or interests that will be included in the February issue of the Chaparral. Report On RSF Association Meeting About Suerte Del Este By Karen Gardner

A few weeks ago the Rancho Santa Fe Association hosted a meeting to discuss the recent move toward paving Suerte Del Este. The Association invited members from the Elfin Forest/Harmony Grove Town Council as well as representatives from the County of San Diego, the San Dieguito Planning Group, SDG&E, OMWD, San Diego County Code Enforcement, Lennar (the developer of the Bridges) and various other agencies and landowners.

It was evident at this meeting that the Association does not want Suerte Del Este paved and is concerned about the amount of traffic currently coming from the Elfin Forest area into Rancho Santa Fe. There are community-wide concerns about overburdening this road.

Though the majority of Suerte Del Este users from Elfin Forest have children in the Rancho Santa Fe school (and thus may have easement rights across the Lennar property), there is an increasing number of users who do not have any business on this road and are trespassing private property. Issues that were discussed included:

- Who has easement rights along Suerte Del Este? (Currently only SDG&E has an easement along the entire road.)
- What is entailed in terms of permits when paving a private road?
- What resource agencies need to be contacted when paving such a road?
- How difficult is gating and enforcement?

Though nothing was officially resolved at this meeting, the meeting provided a chance for the Elfin Forest Town Council to meet with concerned neighbors and enforcement agencies to learn more about the Suerte Del Este problem.

Evidenced by stories in this month's *chaparral*, the issues associated with gating and paving either/or Suerte Del Este and Canyon de Oro are on many minds lately. As traffic becomes worse on Elfin Forest Road, as well as Fortuna Del Este and the two "dirt roads", problems associated with dumping, safety and expediency are getting out of hand.

At the Town Council's March meeting we'll discuss potential solutions and provide insight on what is required to gate or pave any or all of these roads (remember that most of the roads in our community are private and will require action beyond simply "finding the money".) An overview/background presentation will be provided and then an open forum for discussion will ensue. We hope to have speakers from Rancho Santa Fe, OMWD, SDGE, TECC, etc. to provide further insight and background with regard to both Suerte Del Este and Canyon de Oro.

If you are a stake holder on any of these roads and would like to be put on the agenda to speak, please contact any Town Council member or contact Karen Gardner at 760-744-9500. We'd especially like to hear from you if you have a good understanding of the legal issues associated with these roads.

Minutes Of Elfin Forest/Harmony Grove Town Council Meeting By Karen Gardner

Date: December 3, 2003

Call to Order: 7:30 p.m.

Updates: Mid Hoppenrath welcomed the large group and announced that only the central 900 acres in Harmony Grove had been removed from the Escondido Sphere of Influence. Eden Valley and portions of Harmony Grove closest to the preserve were not removed by LAFCO.

Updates for the New Urban West Village at Harmony Grove development included the fact that the public park will now be referred to as play fields, not ball fields, and that the new Fire Station may be located in the quarry area as opposed to the village area. Additionally, Country Club Drive outside of the Village area will not change and Harmony Grove Road outside of the Village area will not be widened. All multiuse recreational trails shown on the County Master Trail Plan map that are within the development will be dedicated to the county to preserve them for the community. New Urban West planned to file their development applications with the county on December 15th.

Evelyn Alemanni announced that Garden Festival tickets are selling quickly and that there is a limited quantity. She reminded everyone to order their tickets early on the website, www.elfinforestgardens.info.

Arie Franken announced that the January Town Council meeting will be dedicated to discussing valley internet service. This will be a meeting that you won't want to miss!

Nancy Reed reported on the recent Board of Supervisors (BOS) meeting with regard to Cielo Del Norte. The BOS approved this very large Elfin Forest project. Community character and traffic concerns were ignored. However, the developer will be required to build traffic circles in Rancho Santa Fe to help ease the traffic problem. Nancy also reported that the developer agreed to restore the trails that have disappeared from the planning map but noted that various resource agencies might not allow the January 2004 trails to be restored. Nancy resigned her position on the Town Council. Her efforts, especially with regard to her trail work, will be missed.

Eric Anderson also reported on the BOS meeting. He let everyone know that Cielo Del Norte will double the size of the Elfin Forest community. Home square footage is not known but lot sizes will be less than the desired minimum of 2 acres.

Mid Hoppenrath announced that the trial period for Eden Valley and parts of Harmony Grove participating in the EF/HG Town Council (TC) had come to an end. All residents from the portion of Harmony Grove not in CSA 107 who were present wanted to join and presented petitions from neighbors who could not attend requesting to join the TC. While some Eden Valley residents wanted to join the TC and submitted petitions with this request, others were skeptical with regard to the benefits of joining our organized group. Much discussion ensued with regard to whether Eden Valley should become a permanent part of the TC.

The fun part of the meeting started after 8:15 PM when **Natalie Chaffer** announced the recipients of this year's Community Service Awards. There were 10 awards given:

- **Harry** and **Julie Zahner** who were the first people to spot the Harmony Grove Fire.
- **Richard Newton** for his hard work in repairing the Elfin Forest sign that had been in place for less than 24 hours before struck and severely damaged by someone driving a stolen car.
- **Ron Martin** for his generous donations of plants to the community.
- Jan Young, Kathy Pickard, and Carla Zilka for all of their hard work on the Quail Ridge project.
- **Doug Dill** for everything he does.
- **Mike Holmes** for his work on the new horse trails.
- **Susan Oddo** for her work with the landscape foundation.
- The **Worth Family** for all of their hard work on debris cleanup along Elfin Forest Road.
- The California Conservation Corps.
- And last but most surely not least **THE ELFIN FOREST FIRE FIGHTERS**.

Meeting adjourned at 8:36 for desserts and coffee.

The developer of the recently approved Cielo del Norte project took exception to San Diego Union-Tribune reporter John Berhman's December 10th story characterizing the development of 154 homes on the 482 acres south of Elfin Forest and Harmony Grove roads as being in Elfin Forest. Berhman was contacted the next day by a representive of the developer who claimed that (despite being in CSA 107) Cielo del Norte was actually in Rancho Santa Fe and they wouldn't share Elfin Forest's use of an Escondido zip code. Nothing was mentioned about Cielo del Norte being in the Escondio school district.

This reaction should highlight the assimilation problems associated with gated developments in CSA 107 that, at least for marketing purposes, try to align themselves with communities other than Elfin Forest/Harmony Grove. How or should we promote a relationship to gain the value of our greater combined voice? Share your thoughts with the rest of us. January 2004

Elfin Forest Recreational Reserve Threatened by Development By Deb LeLevier

The Elfin Forest Recreational Reserve (EFRR) is at grave risk of losing land to new development! The developer who recently won approval for the 482acre, 147-home Cielo del Norte project also has options on the San Elijo Vista property just downstream of the EFRR staging area. He proposes building twenty-nine homes at the top of the "The Way Up Trail" the primary access to the reserve and its new reservoir. Portions of the "Way Up Trail" are actually on the San Elijo Vista parcels and if the developer is successful, the trail would be at the foot of huge fill slopes to new homes.

Access to these homes would require the construction of a road through the reserve staging area, cross the Escondido Creek, and carve its way up the cliff. The only other option would require a road from the Cielo del Norte project up the valley, effectively decimating the "Equine Incline Trail". Either option spells certain disaster for the EFRR. To add insult to injury, the San Elijo Vista property is completely surrounded by open space owned by the water district, the County of San Diego, and TECC. To stick an island of homes in the middle of thousands of acres of open space would be an environmental, aesthetic, and ecological tragedy.

For several years TECC has lobbied the county for assistance in preserving this land. While we've met with some success, we have failed to secure a firm commitment. The good news is the developer is willing to entertain offers; the bad news is he's not willing to wait indefinitely to initiate the planning process while we locate funding. Therefore, TECC must take immediate direct action to save this beautiful area and prevent its associated, widespread destruction.

WHAT WE MUST DO - Nothing demonstrates community support for a project like successful fundraising efforts. TECC is asking you to donate toward the acquisition of this key site. If TECC can come to the table with a sizable contribution, it can leverage the support of the county and other large foundations.

We can't say it loudly enough; developments like this invariably end up with a net loss of open space and quality of life. One look at San Elijo Hills, University Commons, and the newly approved Cielo del Norte projects portend the future if we fail to act NOW! With San Elijo Vista we have the opportunity to preserve the entire parcel, a more satisfying endeavor with a much more satisfying outcome.

Paving Canyon de Oro By Jack Olmstead

Traffic is bad and will soon be worse! We all travel through San Elijo Hills (SEH) where, at this time, there are about 1200 homes occupied. There will be a total of about 3500 homes in the next few years. SEH residents traveling to and from home, construction traffic, and commuters from Escondido heading west in the AM and back in the PM make for even more traffic congestion. The new school, library, condos, and stores in the SEH Village will make traffic move even slower. When these are built, add at least 5 to 15 minutes to get through the intersections. Heading west through University Commons, an expanded business park and Wal-Mart; how much time to get through all that? I'm not trying to be a pessimist, but we should recognize the obvious and plan for it.

I'd like to propose that we start working on gating and paving our special hidden access way to Encinitas, Canyon de Oro, before the trip through SEH becomes too horrendous! Some of us have deeded rights to use the road and most can show prescriptive rights to use it. I live close to the road and don't want to increase traffic by my home anymore than anyone, but I realize this access is a valuable asset for Elfin Forest. We can limit access (to local residents) with a gate. When the road is regraded to its original 22' width and paved we'll have a valuable all-weather access way to Encinitas and Rancho Santa Fe. Travel to Rancho Santa Fe School will take only a couple minutes longer than taking an unpaved Suerte del Este and provide alternate access to the San Dieguito Academy and La Costa Canyon and Torrey Pines high schools.

Emergency vehicles will have another access to our community and we gain another emergency exit. Another important reason is it will probably eventually happen anyway by developers or the City of Encinitas. We need to do it ourselves in order to keep it a private access road!

Canyon de Oro is supposed to be partially paved soon by a developer from the Encinitas side to Rancho Summit Road. Rancho Summit Road will be paved up the hill to the north to a new development that was approved several years ago. This leaves only about 0.55 miles of roadway to improve.

I recommend that the site for the gate on Canyon de Oro be located just east of the intersection of Canyon del Oro and Rancho Summit Road. This allows a single gate to do the job of limiting access from Canyon de Oro and Seaquest Trail/Fortuna del Sur and keeps the gate in public view limiting vandalism.

I volunteer to do what I can to make this project become a reality. The project size will and should require an association to implement and maintain the road and gate. I suggest that we expand one of the existing road associations to encompass this project. All parties who live in Elfin Forest should be invited to participate. Landfill Closure Progress

The County appears to be making slow progress on their closure plan. A Regional Water Quality Control Board meeting is scheduled to review their final closure plan which would be followed by a Solid Waste Management Board review in March 2004. Then comes the contract bidding process. The County supposedly has a source for their dirt cover. This could lead to a late 2004 start of the actual work, but our experience leads us to think that it won't be until 2005 before they get going on the ground.

The School Yard By Jim Depolo

Welcome back to the School Yard! It's been an exciting two weeks once again, with lots to talk about! Before we jump in just a reminder; our next regular meeting is on Wednesday January 21st. As part of the January 21st meeting we will have our second EIR workshop, similar to the one held on December 17th with the intent of gathering community input. We hope to hear from you!

Yes on Proposition K "Mini-Bond" for Rowe -

After much discussion the board voted to go forward and place a small bond, of \$4.8M on the March ballot focused solely on improvements to the R. Roger Rowe site. The bond, now called Proposition K, will be used for improvements in student safety at dropoff and pick-up, updating of fire and electrical systems, compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), upgrading to current seismic standards, and similar "non-glamorous" infrastructure improvements that need to be made regardless of whether we get a second school or not.

The discussion centered not on whether the improvements were needed at Rowe, to which everyone agreed; but rather how the March bond would/could impact a November bond to build a new school. In the end, a majority of the board felt that the March bond could help build momentum and help educate the public in preparation for the larger November bond. It is important to realize that this bond in no way "solves" our over-crowding problem. It is as important as ever that we continue moving forward with plans for the second school.

At our meeting on December 10th we called for nominations for the bond oversight committee with applications due in the school office by 4 PM on January 30th. Please pick up an application if you are interested. We need representation from across the district. There will also be a bond committee forming to help with the public awareness campaign and passing the bond in March.

Quantum - As many of you may have heard, there appears to be a breakthrough on solving "the Del Dios problem" of Quantum. On December 3rd the County gave permission for the developers of Cielo Norte to proceed contingent upon constructing roundabouts at the Del Dios intersections with Via de la Valle and El Montevideo. We believe an additional roundabout at Camino del Norte may also be added, either for other developments in the works or triggered by the school. But importantly, this move will dramatically improve traffic flow into the area and drives some urgency into the process. While there are many details yet to be worked, this is a HUGE breakthrough for placing a school on Quantum.

On December 10th the board approved a Request for Proposals (RFP) to be sent out requesting architectural proposals for designing the new school. The RFP will be sent out after the first of the year with proposals due back on March 5th. As part of the EIR many studies are either starting or in progress at the site including habitat studies, traffic studies, and soil studies. Things are moving along!

School Board Business - December is our organizational meeting and we approved our meeting dates for next year and elected new officers. Our very energetic John Stiker will lead the board in 2004 as President, and we are thrilled that Deb Plummer will continue as Vice President. Jim Depolo will take on the role of Clerk, and will also be writing more of the School Yard articles this year (starting now). Barbara Taylor took on representation at some of the county committees. We all thank Kathy Stumm for the past two years of leadership as Board President! We all look forward to a fruitful 2004 year -- with two bonds now on the horizon it will be a busy one!

School Support - We are looking good in the first interim budget forwarded to the county and would be delinquent if we did not complement both the Endowment and the PTO who are doing a wonderful job of meeting their commitments and supporting the financial health of our school. A highlight to all: the Endowment has a matching gift challenge from now until the end of the year, so if you have not made your contribution yet now is a great time! Contact the school office at 858-756-1141 for more information.

Next Steps - Continue work on the EIR for Quantum, including preliminary design work. Continue to develop Rowe renovation plan beyond the immediate fixes included in Proposition K. Hopefully all of us will enjoy our upcoming holidays, and we certainly wish all the best to you and your families (we're taking a break from the School Yard next issue for the holidays). We'll start up again with our regular meeting on January 21st. Season's Greetings!

Enjoying the Winter Garden By Evelyn Alemanni

My garden gets three traditional treats on New Years day: the roses are pruned, and tulip and gladiola bulbs are planted. January is the best month to plant bare root roses, although if you can buy your "bare root" roses in pots, they will make the transition to your garden much more quickly and be stronger and healthier.

Here's a different way to plan a rose garden. Instead of a color theme, plant roses with the names of family members. I have "St. Joseph" and "Just Joey" for my husband, and the English rose called "Evelyn." You could do a patriotic theme with "Climbing America", "Peace", "Mr. Lincoln", "John F. Kennedy" and "Ronald Reagan" for starters. Or you could have the actor's corner, with celebrities including "Marilyn Monroe", "George Burns", "Barbra Streisand", "Bing Crosby", and "Bob Hope".

Garden Projects for January

January is the best month to get a head start on your summer garden. This is the month for planting all the wonderful bare root items that are available at this time of the year, starting with roses. But fruit trees, strawberries, and lots of other wonderful plants are available in "bare root" form right now, so don't wait. When you bring these plants home, put them in the ground right away!

Maintenance

- No need to water unless several weeks pass without rain.
- Deadhead faded flowers.
- Continue applying snail and slug bait.
- Prune rose bushes and spray with dormant spray.
- Spray deciduous fruit trees with dormant spray.
- Protect plants from frost.
- Pull emerging weeds or spray with herbicide now to avoid lots of work later.
- Water newly planted items.

Plant Now

- Plant bare root roses, trees, strawberries, raspberries, blackberries, shrubs.
- Plant tulip bulbs, gladiolas, iris tubers.
- Plant camellias and azaleas.
- Plant ornamental trees like flowering plum, acacia, magnolia.
- Sow seeds or plant seedlings of winter vegetables.
- Plant spring color pansies, Iceland poppies, stock, larkspur.
- Buy seeds for summer flowers and vegetables to start indoors now.

Fertilize

- Feed cool season lawns.
- Fertilize citrus, avocado, berries and grapes.

Project Wildlife Owl Boxes By Fran Lambert

Want to give back to our wild neighbors this holiday season and help Project Wildlife's raptor team as well? Project Wildlife is working with the Merced High School "Raptor Works" program. The Merced High wood shop uses recycled wood from ranchers in the San Joaquin Valley to build barn owl nest boxes. All proceeds from the Raptor Works program go to a scholarship fund to send Merced High School students to college. Cost is \$32.18 (includes tax) plus \$23.00 for shipping directly to you.

Barn Owls (tyto alba) are commonly found throughout San Diego county. They're often called "nature's mouse traps". These birds are extremely efficient predators of mice, rats and gophers. By putting up a barn owl box, you provide a place for owls to roost and a safe place to nest and raise their family of owlets (typically, 5 to 7 per box.) A 1998 study of the barn owl diet in CA showed that 42% of their diet was pocket gopher, 30% voles (large field mice), 17% deer mice, 6% house mouse and 5% other prey. One barn owl will eat on the average of 155 gophers per year or 53 pounds of gophers! To learn more about visit: <u>www.owlpages.com</u>.

The Project Wildlife raptor team receives a large number of "orphaned" barn owls every year. Typically, we get nestlings that have fallen or been trimmed out of palm trees. Our nest box program is designed to provide a place for the owls to roost and raise a family. In addition to purchasing the box for a worthwhile cause your name would be added to our "Barn Owl Database". During our busy baby season, our raptor team could contact you to see if you have an "occupied" nest box and potentially place one to two Project Wildlife "orphans" in with your owl family to be raised by owl parents in the wild.
